SD1

SD1 Enters Final Year of Rate Realignment

Sanitation District No. 1 will move forward with the fourth year of its residential sanitary sewer rate realignment for fiscal year 2023. This is the final year of the rate restructure, which was developed in 2019 to align sewer rates more closely with the actual cost of providing service and to reduce the impact of declining water consumption on SD1 revenues. Under the plan. SD1 charges a base rate for

the first 2 hundred cubic feet (HCF) of wastewater treated and a variable rate for each additional HCF of wastewater treated. Over the four-year plan, as the base rate increases, the variable rate decreases. The new rates take effect on July 1. The base rate will increase from \$23 to \$26 per month and the environmental surcharge, which helps fund SD1's Clean H2O40 sewer overflow mitigation program, will increase from \$7 per month to \$8 per month.

To offset the increase in these fixed rates, the variable rate will decrease from \$5.24 to \$4.72 per HCF. The rate adjustments are anticipated to result in a five percent revenue increase needed to fund the obligations of SD1's long-term capital program. Depending on the total volume of water used, individual sanitary sewer customers may see their bills increase or decrease, while all monthly residential storm water customer bills will remain unchanged at \$4.54 per household.

WHY IS MY SANITATION BILL **HIGHER THAN MY WATER BILL?**

Do you ever wonder why your sanitation bill is higher than your water bill? After all, drinking water is clean and pure, while wastewater is, well, just sewage.

There are numerous reasons your SD1 bill might be higher than your water bill, including the cost of conveyance, the complexity of treatment and the level of regulation. Drinking water is pushed through pressurized pipelines that are much smaller than sewer lines. These pipes do not have to be constructed at grade, can follow the natural terrain and are typically only 5-6 feet deep.



Sewer lines, on the other hand, are not pressurized. They pull wastewater using gravity and pump stations, and therefore must be built to grade with a certain slope. Northern Kentucky's hilly terrain makes conveying wastewater more difficult. SD1 often has to cut through hills, deep underground and into hard rock. Trench excavation is very expensive.

There are about 1,685 miles of sanitary sewer pipe in Northern Kentucky along with 122 wastewater pumping stations that work together to convey wastewater to one of three large regional treatment plants or a number of smaller "package" treatment plants. SD1's plants treat about 35.5 million gallons of wastewater every single day.

That treatment process has evolved dramatically over the last century. Today, SD1 uses sophisticated biological systems, complicated filters

and modern disinfection methods in a process designed to protect public health

and the environment. That process takes about 16 hours at the Dry Creek Wastewater Treatment Plant.

And when the treatment process is complete, the water SD1 releases is usually cleaner than the river that

receives it. And that's good for our environment and the quality of life within our community.

State and federal regulations have also evolved. When SD1 was founded in 1946, most of our region's sewage was being dumped directly into the Ohio River.

Today, regulators oversee virtually all aspects of SD1's operation, including our Clean H2O40 sewer overflow mitigation program. When we launched Clean H2O40. Northern Kentucky was expe-

riencing about 1.5 billion gallons of combined sewer overflows and 115 million gallons of sanitary sewer overflows each year. These result when wastewater escapes our collections system.

We're working to eliminate and mitigate sewer overflows to make our community a safer and cleaner place. Over the next 20 years, we'll invest nearly a billion dollars in innovative wastewater and stormwater management solutions and infrastructure across our region.

The next time you wonder why your SD1 bill is higher than your water bill, remember the unique challenges that come with collecting, transporting and treating the millions of gallons of Northern Kentucky wastewater every day. SD1 does all of that for about 2 cents per gallon.

Clean Air in Boone County DID YOU KNOW THAT

SECONDHAND SMOKE HARMS WORKERS EXPOSED ON THE JOB?

econdhand smoke exposure causes heart disease, lung cancer, and puts workers at significant risk for stroke. asthma and other breathing disorders. At least 250 chemicals in secondhand smoke are known to be toxic or to cause cancer. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, there is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke.

Even brief periods of exposure to secondhand smoke has immediate adverse effects on the cardiovascular system and can cause coronary heart disease. Breathing secondhand smoke can have immediate adverse effects on your blood and blood vessels increasing the risk of having a heart attack (accessed on 7/7/2022, https://www.cdc.gov/tobacco/data_statistics/fact_sheets/ secondhand_smoke/health_effects/ index.htm). Additionally, secondhand smoke is a cause of breast cancer in premenopausal women.

All workers deserve equal health protection; 27% of Kentucky's

blue-collar workers are exposed to secondhand smoke at work. Only 43% of the 6.6 million food preparation and service workers in the U.S. are protected by smoke-free laws. Restaurant and bar workers have the greatest risk of developing lung cancer and heart disease compared to other occupations. Workers and volunteers in gaming facilities such as bingo halls are also exposed to high levels of secondhand smoke.

Eliminating smoking in indoor spaces is the only strategy that fully protects nonsmokers from exposure to secondhand smoke. Separating smokers from nonsmokers, cleaning the air and ventilating buildings cannot eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke. Working in a smoky environment for 6-8 hours is the equivalent of smoking nearly a pack of cigarettes (16-20 cigarettes). Comprehensive smoke-free policies protect employees, residents and children from the dangers of secondhand smoke inside workplaces and public spaces. Most Florence residents believe that secondhand smoke is harmful and 76% of Florence residents support comprehensive smoke-free policies.

LiveWell Florence, community members and organizations across Boone County are dedicated to changing the narrative and changing the norm when it comes to lung health in our region. "There is no safe level of smoke exposure! As a Respiratory Therapist for over 25 years I have seen the damage

KEEP OUR CHILDREN SAFE...

Protecting children from exposure to lead is important to lifelong good health. Lead in children's bodies is harmful. Even low levels of lead in blood have been shown to affect the ability to learn, pay attention and to achieve academic success. Children age 6 and younger are at the most risk. Since the effects of lead exposure may be permanent, the most important step that parents and caregivers can take is to prevent lead exposure before it occurs.

HOW DOES LEAD EXPOSURE **OCCUR?**

Lead exposure occurs when a child comes in contact with lead by ingesting or breathing in lead or lead dust.

What are Sources of Lead Exposure?

Lead can be found throughout our environment. Children are exposed to lead by breathing in or swallowing things that are contaminated with lead. Lead can be found in:

- Homes built before 1978 containing lead-based paint.
- Dust, soil and/or water may be contaminated with lead.
- A family member working in industries that expose them to lead. Lead dust can be tracked onto carpets, floors, furniture, automobile interiors and other surfaces.
- Consumer products like toys, jewelry and fishing lures. Lead can also be used in plastics.
- Home/herbal remedies using ingredients that contain lead including Greta and Azarcon.

You Don't Have to Be a SUPER HERO to Prevent Lead Poisoning

BEEN EXPOSED TO LEAD?

A blood test is the best way to determine if a child has been exposed to lead. The amount of lead in blood is referred to as a blood lead level, which is measured in micrograms of lead per deciliter of blood (µg/dL). Most children with lead in their blood have no obvious symptoms. Every child should be tested for lead poisoning at ages 9 to 12 months and again at age 24 months. Talk to your child's health care provider or one of NKY Health's County Health Centers about getting a blood lead test.

HOW CAN I PREVENT LEAD EXPOSURE AND PREVENT FURTHER EXPOSURE AND DAMAGE TO MY CHILD'S HEALTH?

Fortunately, preventing childhood lead exposure is possible and cost-effective. Additionally, if your child has been exposed to lead, there are things you can do to help lower lead levels and reduce damage to your child's health.

HOW DO I KNOW IF MY CHILD HAS SOME OF THE THINGS YOU CAN **DO INCLUDE:**

- Have lead-based paint in your home removed by certified lead abatement companies. Do not remove the paint yourself.
- **2.** Take steps to keep children away from areas with lead paint chips or dust.
- 3. Clean dusty areas with wet household cleaners often to remove lead dust.
- **4.** Remove shoes before entering a house to keep soil that may contain lead outside
- **5.** Wash your child's hands, toys, bottles and pacifiers frequently.
- **6.** Plant grass to cover any bare dirt areas in your yard and around your home.
- 7. Vacuum using a HEPA vacuum cleaner.
- 8. Feed your children healthy foods with lots of calcium, iron and vitamin C. Fruits, vegetables and milk are great sources, plus they may keep lead from being absorbed.

Good Oral Hygiene Equals a Healthy Smile A HEALTHY SMILE IS A a day for two minutes. Make sure **GREAT ASSET**

It gives us confidence, and influences our social lives, careers and relationships. Because of this, it makes sense we take a look at our oral health from an early age. Did you know when you were born, you didn't have the bacteria in your mouth that causes cavities? Cavity-causing bacteria is passed to us from family members, usually before our third birthday, making it important not to kiss children on the mouth or share food and drink with them. Children should start seeing the dentist by one or two years of age when their primary teeth have come in.

TOOTH ENAMEL IS THE HARDEST SUBSTANCE IN YOUR BODY

However, acid can break down tooth enamel and cause holes or cavities. When we eat or drink anything with sugar, the bacteria consumes the sugar and releases acid. Your mouth remains acidic for about 20 minutes before pH levels return to normal. This means it is not necessarily sugar that causes cavities but the acid that results from eating sugar. Many foods and drinks are acidic including dairy, citrus, soda and fried foods. These should be consumed in moderation.

IT IS IMPORTANT TO PRACTICE GOOD ORAL HYGIENE AT HOME

To remove plague and bacteria, you should brush your teeth two times

you are using a soft toothbrush and brushing in small circular motions to protect your gums. Flossing is recommended once every day. Floss cleans hard to reach places that your toothbrush cannot get to. If you skip flossing, you are not cleaning up to 40% of your tooth surfaces. In addition to brushing and flossing, schedule a dental visit every six months. Regular dental cleanings and exams from the dentist can prevent cavities or catch them while they are small. It is better to prevent cavities than to treat them!

SMOKING ALSO HAS A NEGATIVE IMPACT ON YOUR ORAL HEALTH

If you smoke, then you may have noticed bad breath or tooth discoloration, but there are more severe consequences that you may not be able to see. Tobacco restricts blood flow to your teeth and gums, resulting in delayed healing after extractions. People who smoke have an increased risk of developing periodontal disease, which effects the bone your teeth are attached to. Bacteria causes the bone to recede and the teeth to become loose, often resulting in tooth loss. Oral cancer can also be a result



DENTAL APPOINTMENTS AND TOOTH PAIN ARE THE LEADING REASON FOR SCHOOL ABSENCES

NKY Health visits elementary schools in Boone, Kenton, Campbell and Grant counties to provide dental assessments. If a student has suspected decay, they are referred to a local dentist for treatment. The dental program completes cleanings and fluoride varnish as well. Fluoride is a mineral that helps strengthen the tooth enamel. Fluoride varnish can be applied twice a year to help prevent cavities. Students may have sealants placed in new molars that are without suspected decay. A sealant is a protective coating put into the grooves of teeth, to keep food and bacteria out. Early preventative treatment can keep your child cavity free for longer.

ummer greetings, Northern Kentucky! ARE YOU PREPARED IF A NEIGHBOR OR LOVED ONE EXPERIENCES AN OVERDOSE?

Naloxone is a medication that can reverse the effects of an opioid overdose when administered when symptoms begin. Overdose deaths typically occur within one to three hours after symptoms first appear. (Giglio, R. E., Li, G., & DiMaggio, C. J., 2015). Research has proven the use and distribution of naloxone dramatically decreases overdose deaths. Former U.S. Surgeon General Vice Admiral Jerome Adams states, "Expanding the awareness and availability of naloxone...is a

BCBD Introduces Paperless Permitting System

Approximately one year ago, the Boone County Building Department began working with Oracle to develop software that would allow building department activities to be performed electronically. With this new system, permit applicants can submit plans electronically, plan reviewers can conduct plan reviews on-line, and inspectors can complete their inspection "paperwork" using their I-pads.

Results from plan reviews and inspections are transmitted immediately to the owners, designers and contractors for their responses. Aside from the tremendous volume of paper saved, staff time is reduced significantly. Paper inspection forms are not required to be filled out before inspections nor transcribed by permit clerks after inspections, and correspondence relating to a project can be referenced on-site without returning to the office.

As of June 1, our former software was placed in a read-only format. The only holdover from our previous system is inspection scheduling;

our permit clerks still schedule inspections in order to keep our nine inspectors working in the same areas. In a county the size of Boone County, it's important to minimize drive time for inspector efficiency.

In order to submit plans, applicants register through an on-line portal at www.boonecountyky.org, selecting "Departments", then "Building Department", then to the on-line portal link at the bottom of the screen. Plans, specifications, permit forms, zoning approvals and occupational license information may then be submitted through the

We're excited to announce the addition of Boone's Landing Marina to the Boone County Parks Department. Boone's Landing Marina is an outdoor recreation facility. It includes a dock, marina, ramp, green space, and bathroom facilities. In the 1960's Big Bone Access Site was developed by the National Park Service and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to provide access to the Ohio River for fishing and boating. The property consists of approximately 42 acres and is fronted by Big Bone Creek which provides a navigable waterway to the Ohio River at mile 516.8. Boone's Landing Marina offers both covered and

uncovered boat storage, pontoon summer docking, a lighted shelter and a boat ramp facility. The Boone Landing has parking spaces for 60 truck/ trailer combos and additional parking for cars only.

The ramp remains open 24/7 for boaters to launch boats. The cost is \$6. We also offer a season pass for \$60.

Boone's Landing fishing area is open 7AM to 8:30PM. The cost is \$4 per person.

Parking at the Landing is \$3 per car.
