School has started, the leaves are beginning to fall, and the cool brisk fall mornings and bright sunshine are once again upon us. With summer winding down, the progress in our Downtown continues as our volunteers, City Boards, Commissions and City Council are working together to build & design a very interesting Downtown Business & Entertainment District offering many unique experiences.

As we continue to recruit and tout our city as great place to live, work & play, our goal is to ensure that all those who frequent our Downtown will find a relaxing, clean and safe place to spend your weekends, evenings and leisure time. Our most recent addition, Springs Park Downtown will soon be joined by a new 7500 sq. ft. state-of-the-art skateboard park, the fall opening of the first phase of the Downtown Alley Loop, new restaurant concepts, wine bar, breakfast venue, art studios and other attractions. As we continue to recruit Companies to choose Lagrange or Oldham Reserve Business Park to locate their business, surprisingly as it may seem; the Company Presidents and site selectors who are charged with making the final decisions, tend to give strong preference to those Cities that have a flourishing, vibrant and prospering Downtown appeal.

Even though the Downtown seems to be seeing new enthusiasm and energy, there are many new great announcements coming in the coming months in the I-71--New Moody Lane Area. As this message

hits your mailbox, I am hopeful that the intersection & turning lane improvement at Crystal Drive will finally be completed. I realize it has taken forever with unexpected delays however, I hope everyone finds the one- million- dollar transportation project to be considered a major improvement for the area. Additionally, to help alleviate the over congested area of Hwy. 53, the much-anticipated new ramps at the Louie Dampier Bridge will be "let" for public bid this month. September 22 with completion in late 2024. Once constructed these ramps will finally provide direct highway access into Oldham Reserve and possibly provide an alternate route as an escape route for the area and employment opportunities. The final leg of this project will be to complete the eventual Ernie Harris/Allen Lane highway loop to intersect at Hwy. 146, which is still moving forward with the construction of a tunnel underneath the CSX railroad tracks.

As an update referencing our Business Park, Oldham Reserve, Trilogy Health Care Services will be opening up their brand-new assisted care living facility in November 2022. This state-of-the-art 90,000 sq, ft. facility will offer approximately three different levels of assisted living for those wishing to stay closer to home in their aging years. We are so proud of the Trilogy's commitment and the beautiful setting that is offered while allowing many job opportunities for those seeking employment. Trilogy Health is the first example of many possible opportunities that now can become a reality because of the many years of hard work, infrastructure planning, utility & road design initiated by The Oldham-Lagrange Development Authority (OLDA), Partners & Staff. As a non-voting member of the OLDA Board, I promise to this community that we are pushing forward everyday by investing in this Business Park to aattract everlasting job opportunities and new company attraction for many years into the future.

As most have heard on social media. there are numerous new businesses that have been mentioned or many would perhaps welcome to our city. As the old Ponderosa has finally bitten the dust, at this

press time, there are no plans or rumors as to what may be built on the site. We receive numerous calls as to why certain types of

restaurants don't choose our city to locate. It is not that we are not trying and talking to those possibilities, however it is the old chicken and egg theory. Do the houses and rooftops required come first or do the businesses such as Chikfil-A and Panera that everyone is asking about to come first? From the business standpoint and demographics, the chain restaurants say the rooftops must come first. The numbers they have quoted to us are about 250,000 residents in a five-mile radius. We definitely do not meet that requirement and most of the present residents that I talk to do not want us to meet that threshold anyway, because of many different reasons.

As your Mayor, I am committed to making this City the safest, cleanest, kindness, vibrant and most welcoming place to call your home. As a youngster growing up here, I want the children and families of this Community to always remember and cherish the memories of growing up in a small town. 

From the Desk of Judge/Executive David Voegele

uestions are raised frequently about a beginning and completion date for the new courthouse building in LaGrange.

After being moved three times during the past few months, the historic section of the Oldham County Courthouse is now at its

permanent site and ready for a two-story addition which will span most of the courthouse block along Jefferson Street, from First to Second Street.

Multiple steps are required to begin construction, and most are now complete. With the old building in place, plans have been finalized and construction bids are being sought. After bids are received and examined, and contractors selected, construction will most likely begin in

November.

Although construction is anticipated to begin, the length of time needed to complete the building is fraught with potential delays.

This uncertainty is not ours alone. Many construction companies in our region are already committed to existing or planned projects. This circumstance, along with rising inflation, supply chain volatility, and the shortage of various skilled trade workers,

may pose serious delays, causing Wehr Construction, our general contractor, to push back the completion from the fall of 2024 to the fall of 2025.

Obviously, this news is very disappointing, and we are hoping these new projections will prove overly cautious.



Even with the building estimate at \$40,970,000 there is enough funding in the budget to complete the project. However, if bids received push the number higher, more funding will be needed from the legislature. The county's contribution is capped at \$2,530,000.

LEWIS AND CLARK TRAIL

Oldham County Tourism was given the unique opportunity by the Lewis & Clark Foundation to develop an Official Lewis & Clark National Historic Trail that would highlight Highway 42 and the Ohio River. This

> Trail would then be marketed by the Lewis & Clark Foundation and the National Park Service.

Tourism viewed creating a Lewis & Clark Trail as an opportunity to develop a much-needed project specific to Westport and the Ohio River, one which incorporates hands-on experiences at our county parks and will also attract visitors to the county.

Six locations have been chosen to promote the entire county, from Creasey Mahan Nature Preserve at the start, to a Gosh-

en bison farm on Hwy 42, then on to four county parks from Westport to Crestwood and La Grange. Each stop has a Lewis & Clark activity for those age 6-15 years old. Once completed, the participant will then be eligible to earn an official Oldham County Lewis & Clark Trail Pin and Junior Explorer Certificate.

This new Oldham County program has already gotten national kudos, as it's the only Lewis & Clark Historic Trail Program in the country developed from scratch by its own community.

COUNTY SPOTLIGHT

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Promoting Conservation of Natural Resources

State Conservation Districts were created as a direct result of the dustbowl of the 1930s. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt recommended the Standard State Soil Conservation Districts Act be signed into law by all state governors. The Oldham County Conservation District was created in 1946. Although much has changed over the decades, our mission remains the same: to promote voluntary conservation of the county's natural resources of soil, water, woodland, and wildlife.

The conservation districts were formed originally to help farmers implement conservation tactics, but with the change in our agricultural

landscape our conservation district now has programs for all sorts of landowners. We offer programs that backyard gardeners and those in a more urban landscape can utilize as well.



County residents may request up to 5 vouchers per year to cover the cost of soil testing at the Cooperative Extension Service (a total value of \$50). Funding is provided through the Oldham County MS4 stormwater program.

Mental Health in Oldham County

Throughout our lives, multiple individual, social and structural determinants may combine to protect or undermine our mental health and shift our position on the mental health continuum.

Individual psychological and biological factors such as emotional skills, substance use, and genetics can make people more vulnerable to mental health problems.

Exposure to unfavorable social, economic, geopolitical, and environmental circumstances-

including poverty, violence, inequality, and environmental deprivation also increases people's risk of experiencing mental health conditions.

Risks can manifest themselves at all stages of life, but those that occur during developmentally sensitive periods, especially early childhood, are particularly detrimental. For example, harsh parenting and physical punishment is known to undermine child health and bullying is a leading risk factor for mental health conditions. Protective factors similarly occur throughout our lives and serve to strengthen resilience. They include our individual social and emotional skills and attributes as well as positive social interactions, quality education, decent work, safe neighborhoods, and community cohesion, among others.

WHAT IS OLDHAM COUNTY DOING?

As part of the community health assessment (CHA) process to inform Oldham County's three-year Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), the Coalition for a Healthy Oldham County conducted a Local Public Health Needs Assessment with coalition members, health department staff, and key individuals from the community. The 2021 assessment identified resources that can contribute toward goals identified during strategic planning and identified existing gaps and barriers that require attention. One of the main goals identified was the need to: Create a Community Culture that Supports Mental Health.

The following objectives were identified to meet this goal:

- EXPAND HEALTH SERVICES TO ADDRESS CO-OCCURRING ISSUES.
- DECREASE BARRIERS TO TREATMENT.
- COMPILE, DEVELOP AND DISSEMINATE LOCAL RESOURCES.

DECREASE STIGMA AND **NORMALIZE MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT AND TREATMENT**

 MAKE MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES **READILY AVAILABLE IN CONNECTION** WITH OTHER VITAL SERVICES ALREADY PROVIDED.

The Oldham County Health Department and the Coalition for a Healthy Oldham County, alongside many community leaders, is working together to address the objectives and meet this goal. Promotion and prevention programs should involve the health, education, labor, justice, transport, environment, housing, and welfare sectors. The health sector can contribute significantly by embedding promotion and prevention efforts within health services; and by advocating, initiating and, where appropriate, facilitating multisectoral collaboration and coordination.

Library Shares New Goshen Branch Designs

he design process for
Goshen's new library is well
underway! Since receiving
a generous land donation,
the library and its Goshen
patrons have been buzzing about
the arrival of its new branch. The
library staff witnessed the enthusiasm firsthand at their Oldham County
Day booth, where they shared design

plans from project-partner Studio Kremer Architects with the public. "It's wonderful to see the community so excited about this addition to our library system," says Susan Bunting, Branch Manager for the Goshen Library. Current plans for the new library include a 16,000-square-foot building that adjoins a 1,000-squarefoot County Clerk's Officea welcomed increase from the Goshen library's current space of 3,000 square feet. "We're thrilled that the new building will allow us to not only grow our collection but also create more public gathering spaces for the community," says Julie

Wilson, Library Director. The new library will still be close by for local patrons, located only 1.2 miles from the current Goshen Library.

To help fund this project, the Oldham County Public Library won a competitive grant from the Kentucky Department for Libraries & Archives through the Public Library Facility

Construction (PLFC) Fund program of \$160,000 a year for 20 years to assist with bond repayment. This totals a \$3.2 million-dollar investment from the state budget into Oldham County. These resources will create much-needed new spaces including a large children's department, a dedicated teen area, and several community meeting rooms of different sizes. Many beloved aspects of the current building will also be emulated in the new design: "We know so many patrons love the warm feel of our current branch, and we want to take that coziness with us to the new building!"
