

Be flexible. We are all navigating new routines, changing circumstances, and new requirements. It's ok if things don't go as planned or as smoothly as you had hoped. We are learning as we go.



Practice healthy coping skills and reach out for help. Do activities that you enjoy, calm you down, or focus your mind and body. These could be arts and crafts, physical activity, listening to music, reading, journaling, watching TV or movies, or chatting with friends. If feelings do not improve, reach out to a trusted adult or mental health professional.

The COVID-19 virus has not been detected in any of the nation's drinking-water supplies. The EPA has reinforced that our disinfection process is effective in neutralizing COVID-19. Based on current evidence, the risk to water supplies is low. Americans can continue to use and drink water from their tap as usual.

At Oldham County Water we are taking proactive measures to ensure we can continue to provide our customers with water services throughout this crisis. Health officials say the provision of safe water, sanitation and hygienic conditions

Acceptable items

- Oil-based or lead paints, varnishes, stains and solvents such as paint thinner, mineral spirits, degreasers, wood preservatives
- · Compact and tube fluorescent light bulbs, PCB ballasts
- Freon cylinders, (small and medium) propane tanks (1 lb. and 20 lb. grill,) and fire extinguish-
- Antifreeze, gasoline, adhesives, tars, driveway sealers
- Lawn, garden and pool chemicals, pesticides, herbicides and fertilizers
- Cleaners such as oven, drain, bathroom, rug, upholstery, spot removers; furniture polishes and waxes
- Metal polishes, waxes and rust removers

- Smoke detectors, mercury thermometers, thermostats and loose mercury
- Dry cell batteries including lithium with taped contacts, NiCad and alkaline

Items not accepted

- Materials from businesses and non-residents of Oldham County
- No motor oil
- No latex or water-based paint
- No lead-acid batteries (accepted at the Oldham **County Recycling Center)**
- Explosives such as gun powder, ammunition and flares
- Medications, regulated medical waste; or unstable wastes as determined by the contractor
- Radioactive materials

What are "Community Cats"?

"Community Cat" is an umbrella definition that includes any un-owned cat. These cats may be "feral" (un-socialized) or friendly, may have been born in the wild or may be lost or abandoned pet cats. Some community cats are routinely fed by one or more community members, while others survive without human intervention. Whatever a cat's individual circumstances, the term "community cat" reflects the reality that for these cats, "home" is within the community rather than in an individual household.

What happens to community cats in animal shelters?

Although often treated as "strays" and held for possible reclaim by an

owner, community cats by definition have no owner to claim them. Overall, only about 1 in 50 cats are reclaimed at most shelters. Feral or very fearful community cats have historically been euthanized at the end of a holding period at most shelters, while friendly cats will commonly be offered for adoption. However, because the number of community cats entering most shelters is significantly greater than the number adopted, even friendly community cats are sometimes euthanized. This often takes place after efforts to find a home have failed and the cat has become sick or overly stressed under crowded shelter conditions.

Ideally all healthy, social cats in communities would be placed into permanent, responsible, loving homes, but many community cats are "feral" and would be neither appropriate nor happy as traditional pets in a home. In our increasingly urban society, there are few "barn homes" into which these cats can be adopted. On the other hand, many feral cats have adapted to living in the community. These cats have found a source of food and shelter just as other wild animals have. Experts now believe the best option is to keep these cats where they are. This can be accomplished through a Trap-Neuter-Return program (TNR).

What is trap-neuter-return (TNR)?

A Trap-Neuter-Return program (TNR) is an increasingly popular option where shelters trap, spay/

neuter, vaccinate, and ear-tip healthy cats then return them to the location where they were found. The fact that a cat is in good condition is considered evidence that it has a source of food and shelter — essentially it already has a "home" in the community, and is likely to continue doing well if it is returned to that home. Spay/neuter and vaccination improves health and welfare of cats and reduces problematic behaviors such as fighting, vocalizing, marking/spraying, and of course reproducing.

What's in a name?

Stream crossing signs

Even as Watershed Coordinator, I often have to refer to a map to orient myself to a location in the watershed. So, when drawing connections to concerns such as the bacteria levels in Ashers Run or the dissolved oxygen levels in South Fork Currys Fork, it's hardly fair to assume this is common knowledge. These streams are all around us, but often out of sight or driven past without notice. A road sign to identify a local stream is analogous to putting a face to a name. Recognizing a place is a first step toward knowing and understanding it.

We strive to empower the community to become more familiar with where our water resources are. Gaining this knowledge helps



community members build deeper connections to our streams. As all become more aware of waterways and the wildlife that calls them home, we hope more will see the benefits of our work and become interested in participating.

Later in October, planting demonstrations will take place in small groups of 10 or less. Demonstration participants will also receive a bundle of live-stakes to plant at home. Stream Buffer Plantings: Is the stream on your property showing signs of erosion? Planting a native

As it turned out, that wasn't the only surgery she'd need that year. And it's why she felt so comfortable turning to Baptist Health La Grange for the next one.

A few months after her gallbladder surgery, Kathleen found a little blood in her stool but wasn't overly concerned. Though her grandfather and great aunts developed colon cancer, they were in their 70s before it happened and she was just 51. Plus, nobody in her immediate family had gotten it. But Kathleen visited her primary care physician, who ordered a colonoscopy. Afterward, she got the news. "There's nothing like waking up and being told you have cancer," Kathleen said.

"The care team at Baptist Health La Grange explained everything about the surgery to me, and told me all the possible outcomes," she said. "I also was warned that depending on the location of the tumor, I might need an ostomy. That kind of freaked me out, but I just wanted the cancer gone."

During her cancer surgery at
Baptist Health La Grange, about 12
inches of her colon were removed.
They were able to preserve just enough
rectal tissue to keep her from needing
an ostomy. Just after the surgery, she
received the good news. "I actually
cried from relief when I heard it,"
she said. Not long after that, she
heard something even better from her
oncologist. All the cancer was gone,
and she wouldn't need chemotherapy
or radiation. Kathleen was thrilled
and grateful. "Later," she said, "I

had genetic testing and learned that even though colon cancer does run in my family, the kind I had wasn't the kind you inherit. How strange is that? Still, my kids are going to start getting colonoscopies as soon as they turn 40!"

"Later," said Kathleen, "I was told the cancer had been there for a while. If I had gotten a colonoscopy when I should have, they might have discovered it sooner. Still, I feel very fortunate. I'm grateful for the world-class cancer care right here in La Grange. And the nursing staff at

If you are 45 or older and have never received a colorectal screening, please talk with your primary care provider. Colon cancer is highly treatable and the survival rate is very high when we can catch polyps early. By the time you have symptoms, this cancer is much more advanced.

The Library is open

The Oldham County Public Library is open for in-person service and public computer use! All three libraries have curb-side or drive-thru book pick up available for everyone. At the moment, hours are limited. Please see below for our current schedule. Times are subject to change. In-person services at the Library include:

- Public computer access:

 Public computers are available at all OCPL locations. Time may be limited if there is a wait, or if they are at capacity.
- Extended wifi: The Library's wifi has been extended into the parking lot at all three libraries, to ensure Internet access 24/7.
- **Public Notaries:** Notaries are available across the library system. If you need this service, please call before arriving to make sure one is available to assist. If your document requires witnesses, please bring them with you. Notarization is provided free of charge.
- Readers Advisory: The collections at the Library have been revamped to make discovering your next favorite book even easier! Not sure what you want to read? Ask a librarian! We are also offering special online reader's advisory for parents looking for children's books. You can request this service at bit.ly/findmeabook
- Printing and photocopying:
 Documents can be printed from
 the public computers. Photocopy
 machines are also available.
 Copies and prints are .20 black &
 white, and .50 color (per side).

- Laminating: Have documents that you need to laminate? You can have letter sized items laminated at any location for \$1 a sheet. For larger items, the Main Library in La Grange has a 36" roll laminator that staff can use to laminate items for you. If you are coming in to use the larger laminator, be aware that there might be a short wait time while the machine warms up. Laminating materials for the 36" machine are .75 per foot.

Consoles check out for 7 days, and are \$20 a day if overdue. They must be checked out on an adult card in good standing. Each console comes in a self contained case that includes viewing screen, controllers, and a few games. Available consoles include Nintendo Switch, Xbox One, and Playstation 4.

STEAM Crates

STEAM Crates are available for check out again! Each crate has materials for a themed activity, books about the subject matter, and suggestions for use. Crates can be requested online and checked out at any location. They check out for one week, and must be returned in person at the Library (these cannot be returned through the book drops). Crate themes include: bugs, chemistry, drawing, engineering, fossils, geometry, LEGO, magnets, primary science, and more! Special equipment from the Lab is also available for checkout, such as Turing Tumbles, Cubelets, and slide converters.

Important information about COVID-19

Cold, flu and COVID-19 symptoms

Does the anxiety of COVID-19 have you questioning every sneeze, sniffle or cough and wondering how best to protect yourself and your community? You are not alone! While we are learning more about the novel coronavirus every day, there are some things we know that can help keep our anxiety in check.

We know that while there are some similarities in symptoms between the cold, the flu and the coronavirus, there are also some differences. This symptom chart might be able to help. If you are experiencing mild respiratory symptoms, you should self-isolate at home, take care of yourself and contact your medical provider to determine next steps. If you are experiencing serious respiratory symptoms, such as difficulty breathing or chest pain, call 911 immediately.

What to do if you're exposed to someone with COVID-19

You might also be wondering what you should do if you are exposed to someone with COVID-19. The guidance is a little different depending on the level of risk

of your exposure. We know that wearing masks lowers the risk of transmission. The lowest risk is through an interaction that was short (under 15 minutes) and where both you and the person that is positive were wearing masks.

If you were exposed to someone with COVID-19, it's important to follow the recommended guidance:

- Medium- or high-risk guidance: Quarantine for 14 days after the last identified date of exposure.
- Low-risk contact guidance: Self-monitor for signs and symptoms of COVID-19 for 14 days after the last identified date of exposure.

Wait one week after your known or possible COVID-19 exposure to be tested. If you are tested earlier, there may not be enough of the virus present to be detected.

Document temperatures and any symptoms for the duration of the quarantine period.

If you are tested during a 14-day quarantine and receive a negative result, you are still required to complete the quarantine.

Getting ready for next season's garden

While most of our gardens are nearly finished producing for the season, it's never too early to begin planning for next year's vegetable garden. As vegetable plants mature and begin to die, removing them from the garden is a good practice, especially if insect pests or diseases were present. While composting dead plant material is an option, remember that compost not managed frequently may not heat up enough to destroy plant diseases or insects that can overwinter on plant material. In these situations, it is best to bag the dead plants and dispose of them with garbage.

Rotating planting locations in the garden helps reduce future pest problems as well. Keep in mind that plants belonging to the same family may share similar disease and insect pests. For instance, tomatoes, eggplants, and potatoes belong to the same plant family and share many of the same pests. For larger garden spaces, plan to plant these crops in different locations within the garden next season to reduce risk of pest damage. This will not likely be an effective pest management tool in small garden spaces.

Fall is also a good time to test soil for nutrient levels and pH. Testing soil now allows gardeners time to make any soil pH corrections necessary before next planting season. Soil testing also gives gardeners direction on what type and how much fertilizer should be applied to promote optimum health and production of garden plants. Get details on how to

Providing hands-on learning during Healthy at Home

What is an AWQP (Agriculture Water Quality Plan)?

The Agriculture Water Quality Plan is a guidance document required by farm owners/landusers of 10 acres or more, consisting of BMPs (Best Management Practices) designed to protect water quality in six different areas:

- Silviculture
- Pesticides and Fertilizers
- Farmstead
- Crops
- Livestock
- Streams
- Other Waters

Each BMP includes definitions and descriptions, regulatory requirements, Agriculture Water Quality Authority requirements, design information, practice maintenance, technical assistance, cost-share assistance.

The statewide plan serves as a guide to individual landowners/landusers as they develop water quality plans for their individual operations.

New pilot program for composting


Free compost bins to good homes!

State Cost Share funding limit raised to \$20,000!



The Kentucky Soil and Water Quality State Cost Share Program underwent a major reorganization over the past three years. The program evolved to better meet the needs of today's conservation landscape, and also included regulation changes that now limit funding to \$20,000 (up from \$7,500). The program pays 75% of actual cost for projects like pasture cross fencing to allow for rotational

grazing, automatic waterers for livestock, stream crossings, and much more. Call or email us to complete a simple application. The next funding cycle deadline is November 1, 2020.

Other programs offered year-round

Pollinator Habitat Installation: Reimburses 50% of material cost to install a pollinator habitat on your property.

Large Dead Animal Removal:

Soil Testing Voucher

From the desk of Judge/Executive David Voegele

Broadband expansion — It's coming!

Internet connectivity is good in some sections of Oldham County, but poor to non-existent in other parts of the County.

Fiscal Court is in the beginning stages of creating an 'open access' fiber optic Internet service in our county, and we need your help to make and build-out our plan.

Working with Lit Communities, an experienced broadband consulting firm, Fiscal Court has developed a community-wide survey which we would like every resident and business to complete.

Every address in the County has been put into a geographical information system (GIS) to track critical information provided through the survey. The information will be used to help build-out service from the 25 miles of fiber optic cable Fiscal Court purchased last year from KentuckyWired when that system was installed in Oldham County.

KentuckyWired is a state-run project constructing more than 3,000 miles of high-speed, high-capacity fiber-optic cable in every Kentucky county for use by public agencies, such as government offices, police posts, universities and dozens of other entities.

Oldham County's fiber expansion starts with installing a robust broadband infrastructure, which will help attract a number of Internet service providers and create competitive offerings and pricing options.

Although the backbone of our current county-owned fiber optic cable is above ground on poles stretching along Highways 42, 53 and 146 from Trimble to Jefferson County, our build-out plan includes a combination of strategies including overhead, underground and wireless connections.

As the system is established, residents will be connected to an

'open access' network where services will be available from not just two companies, but multiple content providers from throughout the country. An additional benefit will be the ability to easily change those providers with a mouse click or telephone call. No one will have to come to a home or business to make changes.

Realistically, build-out of our system will take more than 'flipping a switch'. Taking the Fiscal Court survey will help us gather the information necessary to take the first and succeeding steps in the most efficient manner. When our system is fully deployed, each resident should be able to enjoy access to reliable Internet, with cost and performance options.
